Recommendations for the 2008 State Transportation Improvement Program and Other Programming

Issue: How should SACOG invest its share of the 2008 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) and other regional federal funds, totaling about \$120 million?

Recommendation: The Transportation Committee unanimously recommends that the Board do the following:

1. Conduct a public hearing on the proposed hearing and consider all comments;
2. Adopt the list of projects in Attachment B recommended by staff for the 2008 STIP and other programming; and
3. Direct staff to submit the STIP projects to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for inclusion in the 2008 STIP, and proceed to amend all the projects into the Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (MTIP) at the next opportunity (March-April 2008).

Committee Action/Discussion: At the January Board meeting, staff presented its preliminary 2008 programming recommendations, and the Board directed that the recommendations be released for a 30-day public review. That public review will end in February, the Board holds a public hearing February 21, and then must adopt the program and send projects nominated for the 2008 STIP to CTC. The recommended 2008 programming comes to \$120 million—\$37 million for the STIP (state funds in 2013), \$41 million in Regional Surface Transportation Program funds (federal RSTP in 2009 and 2010), and \$42 million in Congestion Mitigation Air Quality funds (federal CMAQ in 2009 & 2010). The recommendations would fund various transportation projects consistent with Board policies and other state and federal regulations.

The attached list of recommended programming includes \$7.2 million for Air Quality projects and \$11.5 million for Bicycle & Pedestrian projects. SACOG has proposed to EDCTC and PCTPA that they fund proportional shares of the two air quality projects, because they share in the benefits; their decisions are still pending. Yolo County continues to seek full funding for its Road 29 bike lane project; SACOG has been able to recommend only partial funding from regional CMAQ funds

No public comment has been received to date on the recommendations. CTC sent notice on January 30 that, given the current state funding climate, it probably will have to delay some existing STIP projects to later years. SACOG has 26 projects funded for about \$41 million left in the current STIP (beyond 2007/08), and, depending on project delays in other regions, may see twenty or more of those projects, most probably transit projects, move back by one to three years; CTC staff suggested that SACOG list all existing STIP projects by funding source and relative priority, as a guide if it decides it must delay projects, and staff will present such a list at the Board meeting after consulting with the local agencies affected. Recent Caltrans estimates on future CMAQ and RSTP (2008-09 and 2009-10) funds show as much as an \$8 million shortfall from the November 2007 estimates on which this program round is based. This probably means some projects intended for 2010 will end up programmed in 2011, but still can be advanced if additional funding comes via reauthorization or some other Congressional action.

**ADOPTING THE 2008 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION
IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM AND REGIONAL PROGRAMS**

WHEREAS, SACOG, as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency for the Sacramento region, is responsible for the preparation and adoption of a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) for Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo, and Yuba counties; and

WHEREAS, state statutes, Chapter 622 of 1997 enacted by Senate Bill 45, granted SACOG greater responsibilities in State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) project selection, and included in these responsibilities are the planning, programming, and monitoring of state-funded transportation projects; and

WHEREAS, the California Transportation Commission (CTC) has developed programming policies, instructions, and criteria for the 2008 STIP and has asked regions to help implement them through their preparations of their RTIPs; and

WHEREAS, SACOG has passed a resolution (Resolution 1-2008) to pool all 2008 STIP county shares in Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties in accordance with the authority granted it by state statutes, Chapter 622 of 1997 enacted by Senate Bill 45, for maximum programming impact; and

WHEREAS, SACOG supports project nominations in El Dorado and Placer counties, and funding projects in the SACOG region nominated by Caltrans District 3 under the Interregional Transportation Improvement Program; and

WHEREAS, SACOG, as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in El Dorado, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties under federal law, is responsible for programming Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ) program and the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) funds in these counties; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that SACOG hereby adopts the attached project nominations, as amended in hearings, from Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties for inclusion in the 2008 SACOG RTIP; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that SACOG will forward this RTIP for 2008 to the CTC and recommend that the projects included be programmed and funded as presented by SACOG; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that SACOG staff is authorized to make technical modifications to the projects as proposed, to amend project descriptions, costs and program year as needed to reflect changes requested by project sponsors, to provide clarification, or to achieve a balance of program funding between programming years which may be requested by the CTC, to the extent these amendments do not alter project nominations substantially or remove any project from the RTIP; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that SACOG also hereby adopts the attached project nominations for CMAQ and RSTP, as amended in hearings, from Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties for inclusion in the SACOG Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (MTIP).
